PARENTS AND TEACHERS COVER THE COST OF RUNNING THE SCHOOL THEMSELVES. THEY'RE ASKING FOR BASIC TEACHING MATERIALS AND A BUILDING.

We are working in an open field here. As we are working in the open-air there are no materials for us to use, like chalkboards. A chalkboard is a big challenge, because when I have to work with the kids. I have to take their books and write everything down for them. Another thing is that we are next to the road. While I'm teaching, the kids are watching the cars and shouting at the trucks. Noise is a huge challenge, and our classes are also not very far from each other. As I am a teacher of Grade 1, next to my class, there's Grade R. Once they hear other kids doing Grade R stuff, they also do the same.

They are young kids, so they can't spell. You say something else, and then they write something else. Another challenge is the weather. Sometimes it gets hot. You will find that kids want to learn, but they have to protect themselves from the sun, or stay under the trees and be far away from others. So, the fact that we are outside affects the kids, they get burnt by the

We want a better education for these kids, so that we can be proud of them, because if we don't educate the kids, they might go and use drugs. Even if they give us some containers, or help us to build here in this place. So that kids will be able to learn.

They wanted us to take the kids to nearby schools, and those schools are full now. So the reason why the kids are here is because the schools are full.

THE DEPARTMENT SAYS IT "CANNOT SIMPLY APPOINT TEACHERS OR CREATE NEW SCHOOLS IN SUCH A MANNER. WE HAVE TO CONSIDER A VARIETY OF

FACTORS - INCLUDING THE FACT THAT OTHER AREAS HAVE MORE SERIOUS CHALLENGES WITH REGARDS TO ADMISSIONS AND SHOULD BE PRIORITISED."
